


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

JCA selected Microsoft Edu Showcase Incubator School for 2021-2022

JCA started the year with the opening of the Warning Innovation Research Center, a brand-new technology center that would rival universities. The IRC boasts a robotics lab, broadcasting studio, two engineering labs, and five student collaboration pods.

Following the big start to the year, Joliet Catholic Academy was chosen, as one of two Illinois schools, to be an Incubator School in the Microsoft Showcase Schools program.

"Microsoft supports Schools in the Showcase School program with resources and ideas to turn their vision into reality. Building on our decades of work with policymakers, school leaders, and educators around the world, Showcase Schools create student-centered, immersive, and inclusive experiences that inspire lifelong learning, stimulating development of essential future-ready skills so students are empowered to achieve more." Upon completing the MS Showcase School Incubator program, the elite list of Microsoft Showcase Schools will include JCA. There are currently two Showcase Schools in Illinois and 39 nationwide. As a full-fledged Showcase School, JCA will be an inspiration, example, and resource for other local schools.

JCA is one of three schools representing the US component of the Global Training Partners, Educational Collaborators, and the Microsoft Datacenter Community Development Program (the Microsoft Digital Transformation Project). Described as a "global project with a local flair," the project provides leadership and



training on developing students' 21st-century skills for a select number of schools in Dublin, Amsterdam, and Chicago.

Three JCA educators were accepted into Microsoft Innovative Educator Experts, proving their MS program knowledge, innovative technology techniques, and passion for teaching and learning. Congratulations to Tom Cranmer- History teacher, Aimee Schertz-Technology Integration Specialist, and Jennifer Szynal- Music teacher. They are three of 27 Illinois educators who are a part of the global MIEE program for 2021-2022.

JCA inducts 7th Hall of Champions-Athletics Class

JCA's Hall of Champions pays tribute to the boys and girls athletes, coaches and contributors from the three schools that make up JCA: De La Salle (1920-1933), Joliet Catholic High School (1933-1989) and St. Francis Academy (1869-1989). JCA was established July 1, 1990. Joliet Catholic Academy recently inducted its seventh Hall of Champions class, which continues to speak to the depth of tradition and talent on and off the playing fields that the Angels and Hilltoppers have produced over the years.

This year's honorees were inducted with a lunch and ceremony in the Warning Family Innovation Research Center on Friday, September 17, 2021. They were also honored in front of a home capacity crowd during pregame of the JCA football game vs. Providence Catholic.

Congratulations to this year's honorees: Matt Cimo '79, Mike Goolsby '00, Christine Scheibe, and the late Tony Janc.



Matt Cimo '79 Joliet Catholic High School Basketball **Baseball**

Cimo is a graduate of JCHS' Class of 1979. On the hardcourt, he was a member of the first Hilltopper basketball team to make it to the Sweet Sixteen of the IHSA Playoffs. During an illustrious career at the Hill, Cimo was named All-State in basketball and All-Area in baseball. Cimo


went on to play at Eastern Illinois, starring for the Panthers during their run to the NCAA Division II National Championship game in 1981, where they would finish as runnerup. At the end of his junior year at Eastern, Cimo was drafted by

the San Francisco Giants in the 14th round of the 1982 draft. Cimo played eight seasons in the minor leagues as an outfielder with the Giants, Cubs, Philadelphia Phillies and

Baltimore Orioles organizations, reaching as high as Triple-A before a back injury ended his playing days. In 1982 he was named a Pioneer League All-Star and in 1987 he was named the AA Southern League's "Best Hustler". That year, Cimo hit .308 with 18 home runs and 45 extra-base hits.

He began his teaching and coaching career at Auburn, Alabama in 1992. Has been to 10 Final Four's and has made six state championship game appearances, winning four overall state titles. Cimo also had the honor of coaching his son, Tanner, on two Auburn State Championship teams. He has been named Alabama Coach of the Year five times, National Federation Coach of the Year three times, and ABCA Southeast Coach of the Year once. In 2021, Cimo was inducted into the Alabama Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame and her is currently just shy of 600 wins as Auburn prepares for the spring 2022 season.

Son of Ernie and Earlene Cimo, brother to JCHS alums Brad and Jay Dee Cimo, Cimo is the proud father of Alissa (Nick) and Tanner (Perri) Cimo. He is a Lockport native.



Hilltopper football legend Mike Goolsby ('00) was a member of the JCA 1999 IHSA Class 4A State Championship team under Dan Sharp, beginning a dominant era where JCA would go on to capture five state titles in a six-year period. Goolsby, a three-year starter in

football at JCA, was named the 1999 Illinois Gatorade Player of the Year, while also earning All-American honors from Parade, USA Today, and Reebok.

Goolsby went on to star at the University of Notre Dame, where he became one of three freshmen to letter during the 2000



season. In 2002, he became a starter at middle linebacker for the Irish, leading the team to 8-0 and 10-1 starts, ranking third on the team in tackles with 76, and leading the team in tackles for a loss at 13. Goolsby returned in 2004 after a labrum injury to lead the Irish with 97 tackles. He was named the Walter Camp National Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts in ND's upset victory at No. 9 Tennessee.

Goolsby signed with the Dallas Cowboys in 2005 and reportedly was the second-highest paid free agent that season. The following year he was with the St. Louis Rams, where he played in two NFL games.

In 2020, Goolsby accepted a position as an analyst/ commentator with BlueandGold.com, a Rivals-network company offering Notre Dame football coverage. He currently works as a sales representative with Patterson Dental, while also providing private football instruction for recruits in Omaha, Neb., with Game Changers Academy.

Christine Scheibe Joliet Catholic Academy Volleyball

Recently retired, longtime Angel volleyball coach Christine Scheibe has a career record of 602-198-10 for a .753 winning percentage while playing one of the toughest schedules in the state. When Scheibe took over the program in 2000, the Angels had been to state three times under three different coaches, earning two state trophies.

Her teams won three state championships, including the first state title by a girls team in school history. That honor belongs to the 2003 team that went 39-2-1 and won the Class AA state championship. The Scheibeled Angels also won back-to-back Class 3A state titles in 2008 and 2009, finishing with 39-3 and 41-1 records, respectively. Both teams were ranked among the best in the nation. The 2009 team went undefeated against teams from Illinois.



JCA also finished as the 3A state runners-up in 2010, 2014, 2015 and 2019, took third in Class AA in 2006 and in 3A in 2018, and finished fourth in Class AA in 2005 for a grand total of 10 state trophies in 20 seasons — a remarkable accomplishment.

Scheibe was selected Coach of the Year three times by the Daily Southtown (2002, 2014, 2018), once by the Joliet Herald-News (2011) and three times by the East Suburban Catholic Conference (2003, 2007, 2009).

The recipient of the Sr. Anna Marie Becker Award for service to JCA, Scheibe was inducted in 2019 into the East Suburban Catholic Conference Hall of Fame and in 2016 to the Joliet Catholic Academy Hall of Fame.

A three-sport athlete and high school valedictorian at Morris, Scheibe played basketball in college at Illinois Wesleyan, where she earned her bachelor's degree in elementary education.

Scheibe, who teaches freshman and sophomore English at JCA, resides in Joliet with her husband Bill, a senior content editor for the Chicago Tribune.

Tony Janc Joliet Catholic High School Coach and Athletic Director

Tony Janc served at Joliet Catholic High School for 27 years, from 1957 until 1984, where he taught Math, English, and Religion. Janc coordinated the Christian Service program at JCHS, and worked on Kairos Retreat for seniors.

Janc may be best known for serving as the Athletic Director at Joliet Catholic for 17 years, from 1967 to 1984. He was a part of

the leadership team at Joliet Catholic during transition to the Illini 8 Conference in 1970, continuing until 1981. The conference offered a local opportunity for the Hilltopper athletic programs to shine



in Will County against several local public high schools. Janc also oversaw the transition to the East Suburban Catholic Conference, an affiliation JCA maintains to this day.

Janc wore many hats at JCHS, also coaching baseball, swimming, and track. He coached football for 15 seasons, including IHSA State Championship teams in 1976, 1977, 1978, 1979, and 1981. HE helped expand Joliet Catholic's athletic programs to a position of prominence throughout the state and country, while enhancing Joliet's reputation as the City of Champions.

Janc is also a member of the Lewis University Hall of Fame, inducted in 1982 for baseball and coaching. He finished his teaching and coaching career at St. Pius Catholic High School in Festus, MO. Jance passed away in June of 2020, preceded in death by his loving wife Mary Jo Janc; and son Michael Janc. He is survived by his daughter Mary Kristin "Kris" Elkins of Morgantown, WV.

JCA Assistant Athletic Director Dave Douglas inducted into the IHSFCA Hall of Fame

Longtime Joliet Catholic Academy assistant athletic director and associate head football coach Dave Douglas '75 was recently inducted into the Illinois High School Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame. The IHSFCA Class of 2021 Hall of Fame induction ceremony took place on Saturday, June 19 at the Shirk Center on the campus of Illinois Wesleyan University. Douglas joins former Joliet Catholic Academy football coaches Gordie Gillespie '86, Bob Stone '14, and Dan Sharp '18 as Hilltopper coaches inducted into the IHSFCA Hall of Fame.

Dave Douglas has been employed at Joliet Catholic High School and Joliet Catholic Academy since 1985. Over an incredible 36-year coaching career, Douglas has been a part of nine IHSA Football State Championship coaching staffs ('87, '90, '99, '00, '01, '03, '04, '07, '18) and three IHSA State Runner-Up staffs ('96, '09, '11). Over that same time period, the Hilltoppers captured Douglas served as a lower-level assistant head coach from '85 to '86 and joined head coach Jim Boyter's varsity staff in 1987. From 1989 until 2012, he served as the offensive line coach for head coaches Bob Stone and Dan Sharp. In 2013, Douglas was elevated to associate head coach and has served in that capacity until now under current head coach Jake Jaworski.



His offensive lines have paved the way for one of the most formidable rushing attacks in IHSA history. The 2007 Hilltoppers set an IHSA record with 6,609 rushing yards in a season. He's coached offensive lines that produced two of the top 20 most total yards in a season in IHSA history (6,651 yards in 2007; 6,590 yards in 2011. The Hilltopper rushing attack also holds the single-game IHSA State Championship game rushing record with 747 yards on 64 attempts in 2011. The Hilltoppers routinely send multiple offensive lineman to the collegiate ranks, with over 100 former Douglas proteges continuing their careers at the NCAA,

NAIA, or NJCAA levels.

Douglas' career in education began as a math teacher at Custer Park Grade School in Braidwood in 1980. He joined the math department at Joliet Catholic High School in 1985. Throughout the years he has served in a variety of capacities, most recently as Assistant Athletic Director.

Not only has Douglas enjoyed a storied coaching career in football for the Hilltoppers, his service to the JCHS, St. Francis Academy, and JCA athletic departments may be unmatched in school history. Douglas has served as head girls basketball coach, sophomore head baseball coach, varsity badminton coach, and most notably head softball coach over this 36-year career at the three schools (JCHS and SFA combined to form Joliet Catholic Academy in 1990).

Douglas guided the JCA Angels softball program from 1990 to 2016, posting a 527-367 overall record. The Angels won nine regional titles, reached a sectional final, and won 20 or more games in 16 of his 26 seasons at the helm. He passed the reigns over to fellow JCA Assistant Athletic Director and Tina Kinsella in 2016.

Douglas credits several Hall of Famers that he had the opportunity to work with throughout his career including Gordie Gillespie, Bob Voss, Carl Hunckler, Mel Deskin, Bob Stone, and Dan Sharp.





JCA names Kisha Cameron Head Girls Volleyball Coach



Joliet Catholic Academy's administration is proud to announce the hiring of Kisha Cameron as the next head varsity volleyball coach, succeeding Hall of Famer Christine Scheibe. JCA athletic director Jim O'Brien, also new to his position taking over for longtime athletic director Dan Sharp, said, "I am very excited to have Kisha lead the girls volleyball program. She has coached at the high school and college levels for years. She takes over a program rich in tradition and I know she will do an excellent job. Most importantly, she will have a great impact on student-athletes, just as she has for our students in the counseling department."

Cameron has spent the past three years as the head sophomore/ junior varsity coach under Scheibe and was hired in August of 2020 as JCA's Director of Diversity. A native of Topeka, Kansas, Cameron graduated from the University of Illinois-Springfield, where she played collegiate volleyball and received a B.A. in Psychology. From there, she continued her education and completed her M.A. in Professional Counseling at Argosy University. Her work experience includes years of providing crisis and trauma informed counseling, substance abuse and addiction treatment, individual and family counseling, and victim advocacy. She spent nine years as a head women's collegiate volleyball coach at Joliet Junior College, an assistant women's volleyball coach at Harper College, and has also coached for eleven years in the boys' and girls' programs for Ultimate Volleyball Club and Sports Performance Volleyball Club.


Cameron said, "I'm excited to build upon the success and tradition of JCA Angel volleyball under Coach Scheibe. The future is bright with the talent in our hallways, and we are happy to have most of the program's staff returning. I'm also excited about some additions to the staff that will help us update our offensive and defensive systems."

Under Scheibe over the past 21 seasons, the Angels have compiled a 602-198-10 record, won three state championships, finished second four times, and have captured ten IHSA state trophies. The Angels won 11 sectional titles, including six in a row from 2005 to 2010 and have won 17 regional titles, including 15 straight from 2001 to 2015. The program has produced several Division-1 standouts, including two-time NCAA All-American and 2005 Big Ten Player of the Year Sam Tortorello (Penn State), Olympic bronze medalist Kelly Murphy (Florida), 2009 Gatorade Illinois Player of the Year Annemarie Hickey (Wisconsin), and three-time WNBA All-Star Allie Quigley (DePaul/WNBA's Chicago Sky) among the notables.

At press time, the Angels were off to yet another successful season, ranked No. 4 in the Daily Southtown Top 10 poll, and off to a 14-5 overall start. Look for the Angels to make a deep run yet again in the IHSA Class 2A state playoffs in late October/early November.

JCA names Kaitlyn Williams '16 Head Girls Basketball Coach





Joliet Catholic Academy's administration is proud to announce the hiring of Kaitlyn Williams '16 as the next head girls varsity basketball coach. Williams succeeds Jim O'Brien, who was recently named JCA's new athletic director. Williams recently graduated from Lewis University with a degree in accounting, and will work in the JCA business office in addition to her coaching duties.

O'Brien said, "Kaitlyn will be a great addition to our girls basketball program. The energy and knowledge she will bring every day to practice and games will be tremendous. She has surrounded herself with great basketball people during her playing career, such as Sam Quigley-Smith (former Lewis and now SIU-Edwardsville head coach)."

Williams recently completed a stellar collegiate playing career split between Division-I Loyola University Chicago and Lewis University, highlighted by a junior year where she averaged 9.3 points per game and shot a team-high 36% from the three-point line. A starter for most of her collegiate career, Williams helped lead Lewis to a 59-26 overall record over final three years, three NCAA Division-II tournament appearances, and a top-three national ranking in 2018-2019

Known as a sharpshooter throughout her prep career, the 2016 JCA graduate averaged 15.0 points, 4.0 assists, and 4.0 rebounds per game for an Angels team that lost to top ranked Morgan Park in the sectional finals in 2016. All five of JCA's starters ended up playing collegiately. Williams also helped the Angels to a state runner-up finish in 2013-2014 as a sophomore.

Williams said, "I couldn't be more excited to start this new journey at my alma mater with all of these amazing young women. My passion to be involved in their process of growth and development on and off the court is what I am most grateful for. I can not wait to get started. Once and Angel, always an Angel!"

Spring SportsJCA girls softball and

girls soccer both finish second in state

JCA has been known for years for baseball, football, dance and girls volleyball, but softball and girls soccer are two sports bringing attention to the rest of the girls sports.



This past spring, the **JCA girls softball team** finished 23-9 overall, placing second in state at the IHSA Class 2A finals in Peoria. The Angels lost 4-0 to undefeated Rockridge, who finished 29-0. Division-I Loyola-bound ace Andrea Broniewicz finished 18-7 overall on the mound and was named to the Herald News First Team All-Area Team, along with second baseman Morgan Bruno (.370 batting average). Freshman Wrigley Fanter was named Second Team All-Area, and UIC-bound catcher Jolee Santiago was named to the Honorable Mention All-Area Team.



The JCA girls soccer program capped an incredible multiyear run with and IHSA Class 2A runner-up finish as well, losing a heartbreaker in the final 1-0 to Troy Triad. The Angels, 16-2-1 overall, were led by senior Morgan Furmaniak, who scored 39 goals on the

season and was named Joliet Herald News Girls Soccer Player of the Year. Alaina Wildenradt scored 17 goals, and Emma Gruber added 13 for the high flying Angels offensive attack. Furmaniak, Kendall McLeod, and goalie Abby Pasternak were named First Team All-Area; Wildenradt, Kate Gerdes, and Gruber were named Second Team All-Area; and Breanna Ciemny, Brynn Higgins, and Kailyn Terry were named Honorable Mention All-Area.

"We put softball in the mix and I hope it stays in the mix for years to come. It was great having people come all the way out to Peoria to watch us," Charlie Kinsella said. "Girls soccer, softball, girls track, girls tennis, girls cross country – this has been a great year for JCA girls sports."

For Tina Kinsella, who serves as girls athletic director, it is something she is happy to see.

"We are a dominant school and we are showing that across our female sports," she said. "A lot of people know us as Catholic High and football and baseball, but now here come the Angels."

The JCA varsity dance team finished in 3rd place at the IHSA Class 1A State Dance Finals, which for the first time was held virtually. The Angels have become a regular at the state finals, after capturing the schools 32nd team championship in 2019. The Angels also finished fourth at the 2018 finals and were national semi-finalists in '15, '16, and '17 before joining the IHSA playoffs in 2018. The Angels varsity dance team was lead by head coach Kelsey Kunz and team members

JCA Wrestling finished in 3rd place at the IWCOA (Illinois Wrestling Coaches and Officials Association) Summer State Tournament. The IHSA State Tournament was cancelled due to COVID-19. The Third-Place trophy was the first-ever state trophy in program history. The Hillmen were led by IWCOA Class 2A Individual State Champions Shay Korhorn, Gylon Sims, and Dillan Johnson. Junior Owen O'Connor finished on the podium as well in



third place. JCA senior Dean Hamiti, Jr. was denied an opportunity to become one of only a handful of IHSA athletes to capture four-consecutive individual state championships. Hamiti was a three-time IHSA state wrestling champion, but reported early to the University of Wisconsin, were he is on scholarship, after the winter wrestling season was postponed. Hamiti was named the 2021 Illinois National Wrestling Hall of Fame Dave Schultz High School Excellence Award Winner, one of the most prestigious prep wrestling awards nationwide.

The Hilltopper Football program went a perfect 6-0 during the abbreviated COVID-19 high school spring season. The Hilltoppers were led by seniors Devean Washington (U.S. Naval Academy), Jabril Williams (West Point), Pat Strocchia (Drake), William Berry (Northern State), Ja'Arie Mack (Northern State), Anthony Kasper (Northern State), and Jake Dixon (Northern State). At press time the fall Hilltoppers were on a program 12-game winning streak at 6-0 and ranked No. 1 in several IHSA Class 4A polls, and in the top 3 regardless of class in several statewide polls.

"We have two sets of twins, so four that are in the same school. The scholarships are so important to us for the opportunities they afford us. It's a double whammy when we try to do things, so having the scholarships means more to us than people even realize."

"When you get older, you talk about your education growing up and people ask, 'Did you go to Catholic School your whole life?' And I think, 'I did.' It's really cool. It's kind of rare."

"I literally went to Catholic school from third grade even through college. I went to DePaul. So, I think growing up, I took it for granted. I didn't realize how special it was, the family atmosphere and the lifelong friendships I got from going to a Catholic school. And I think a lot of people, you know, they don't get to experience that."

"I feel like we were lucky. My brothers and sister and I were able to get scholarships to have a Catholic education. We lost our dad when we were young and my mom, a young mom herself, took care of us four kids. I think we were all under 7 years old at that time."

"It was really



important for her and my dad for us to go to a Catholic school. He was from a family of faith and all of them went to the same Catholic schools. I think it was just really special that we were able to still do that with the help of these donations. I think it's just something that I took for granted, and maybe I didn't even realize that we had help."

"When you're young, you don't ask these kinds of questions. You just think, 'This is life. I get to do this and have this opportunity.' So, being older, it just makes me appreciate that we had generous people that were able to help us get through those tough times and give me these memories that I will cherish forever."

"When thinking about my childhood and my experience at St. Pat's and Joliet Catholic, and even DePaul, I have so many great memories. And I think that's really centered around the traits of a Catholic school, whether it's a smaller atmosphere or that it's more family-oriented."

"I think it's really important to have that opportunity for families that may have the same kind of struggles that we had whether it's a single-parent household or maybe one of the parents lost a job or just be it the fact that wherever you grew up economically, I think it's important that everyone has that opportunity to have an amazing education."

Once I learned what it was about, it kind of made me think back to my childhood, realizing how much scholarships helped me. "We're a family of four: myself, my husband, Andre, and our boys, Aiden and Jordan. Jordan was in public school for four years, and it wasn't really a good experience for him. There was a lot of bullying going on and a lot of overcrowding in the classroom. Because of the larger-sized classroom, he wasn't given a lot of attention, and he didn't excel really well."

"That was a unique situation for me to handle because I really wasn't familiar with it. While I grew up in the inner city of Chicago, I went to Catholic schools."

"Some parents told me I didn't have to send my children to

private school because they would still get the same education in public schools, but that was not accurate."

"I told my husband: 'I'm not going to [keep them in public school]. This is too important.' So we pulled him out and decided on private school. And immediately we saw the change in my son:



his grades, his personality, just everything improved."

"When Jordan went to St. Paul, he was given more attention because he was in a smaller class, and he was given that foundation of spirituality, which was very important for our family. Aiden, our youngest, he started out with that foundation which was really great, and we were able to kind of continue that culture and foundation at home. So, it was helpful for our family and our family bond to carry over the same values at home and in school."

"My husband went to public school, so this was something new for him to kind of learn about the meaning and the importance of religion and its usefulness when implemented into the school environment, as well as the benefits of the small classroom environment for our children."

"There was a lot of growth within our family and for my husband, also, through being able to experience that unique family system that was brought about with a family-integrated school system. Because of the small classroom sizes and family community, everyone is kind of familiar with everyone, and everyone does their best to kind of help everyone. So, that kind of system really helped my husband, too.

"Andre was laid off a few years ago and the same year my father was murdered. We went through a rough patch, and we were awarded the scholarship that year. That was the first year that we were awarded our scholarship. So, it actually came at the perfect time."

"Then we were recipients again the following year, which was really a blessing. We didn't really think that we were going to be able to get it. My son was nervous. We were all nervous, and we got on the computer and we were waiting in line. We prayed, and we were in shock when we managed to get it. [My son] said, 'Wow, we got it,' and I said, 'Yeah, we got it.'"

"With the scholarship, Jordan was able to attend high school at Joliet Catholic, which was his first choice. And that is something that he is looking forward to for his sophomore year, so we have applied again. But of course, high school is expensive. It's an expensive school to attend. Private school is very expensive, so we need all the help and support that we can get."

"I always say, we pay property taxes, but we don't attend the schools in our district and that's kind of unfair because I believe our money should go to wherever our kids go."

"We are investing in our children's education, and that money should be allocated where we choose for them to get the education that we would like for them to receive."

"I think that it's very important for people to have the ability to donate to the tax credit scholarship program because they care about the educational needs of the community and that people have the choice and a right to get the education that they want for their children. These schools need to remain in existence to allow families the freedom to select the best education for their child."

"It's very important that politicians allow this tax credit to continue so my family can have the opportunity to be a part of a school system where our children and my family as a unit thrives."
